Our school, working with you, has shown it can be flexible and adaptable in responding to the challenges of corona virus (covid-19) and will continue to meet student needs as we look towards the end of the 2020 school year and ahead to 2021.

Dear Parents,

It was delightful to see so many happy students returning to school this week and our staff were delighted to see them! As we wandered our schools, we were interested to note that our students have remembered the routines that were established earlier in the year and so the transition back to onsite learning has been very smooth.

Thank you to the community for following processes. You will have noticed that we have maintained Covid safe practices for student entry and exit. Each gate has alphabetical signs indicating entry and exit points according to student surname. At both Campuses, Foxwood Drive and La Rochelle Boulevard have three gates which can create some congestion. We are therefore encouraging families to either park further away or use available community carparks and go for a walk. The gates are staffed each morning and the walk will be a safe and pleasant one.

As we are entering term 4, please remember that school hats are compulsory. Students should bring suitable snacks and lunch and of course a water bottle is important, (labelled with class and name) especially as the weather is warming up. Our water taps remain taped off, and are not available. Our canteens will be open on limited days at each campus and this will be communicated by our canteen manager Leah Martin.


We look forward to 26 October when we can welcome our remaining Year 8 and 9 students. Until this time, these students will continue with remote and flexible learning and live Webex/Teams lessons with their class. Attendance is compulsory.

Year 7, 8 and 9 students must wear a fitted mask on their way to and from school, and when they are on site during the school day. Please remember that face shields, bandanas and scarves are not permitted. There will be no camps, excursions or swimming programs this term. Due to time lost in onsite learning, our staff have planned targeted assessment and individualised learning plans. Additional staff have been employed to deliver this 'point-of-need' instruction.

Thanks to Mrs Huell who is continuing to coordinate the Student Excellence program. These select students engaged in some stimulating activities during the holidays and we look forward to hearing more about this program as the term progresses. Such a valuable and enriching opportunity for these students.

Currently attendance messages are sent out at 11.30am. As of next week attendance alerts will return to the normal time of 9.30am. We require families to record any student absence on compass or alternatively you can contact the office.

We want to thank the community once again and hope that Term 4 brings lots of learning and laughs for our students. Trent has missed everyone terribly, and is patiently waiting for all of his friends to return to school again.





Welcome back to term 4 of this crazy year! This year, Music Matters has been shared around the Music staff as a way to link the community more deeply with these teachers and student learning. I'm sure you'll agree that it's been great to hear from them! It's been a while since I last wrote this piece, but here goes...

#### PRIMARY TO YEAR 7 CLASSES

We look forward to welcoming these students back to our music program and plan to have them away from a screen, playing instruments and making beautiful noise! This will include using our increasing stock of marimbas (tuned percussion) and pulling out our ukes for upper primary.

## VET CERTIFICATE III IN MUSIC PERFORMANCE, END OF AN ERA!

As you will know, we run a Certificate II in Music Industry with our Year 9's and a two year Certificate III in Music Performance with students from the school in the area at year 10 to 12 level. From 2021, the Certificate III Music Performance program will migrate to Williamstown High. This means that any new students to the program will start at Williamstown next year, while the group that began with us this year will complete their qualification with us in 2021. At that point, we will no longer be running a Certificate III VET program. Carranballac College and particularly, Mrs Colston-Ing, has put a mammoth amount of work and resources into this program - as evidenced by our above State average scores in all areas of the course in 2019. ## YEAR 8 SOUND TRAP, TAKE A LISTEN!

#### STEM CHALLENGE




During Term 3, all year levels from Foundation to Year 9 participated in a STEM challenge. Students had to design, plan and create a building, ensuring it was strong enough to hold the weight of their favourite book. There were videos and photos sent to classroom teachers of the amazing plans and extraordinary buildings. Here are just a few samples from the Year 3 level.



Mike from 3C made a robot shaped building. Underneath the main part of the building is a clear plastic container with a Minecraft LEGO piece inside. Mike also sent in a video of how the container LEGO piece, can be raised into the building by pulling on some strings. Mike's plans were very impressive.



Luka from 3P made a building where each floor is made using different materials. The ground floor is a cereal box, the first floor is a plastic storage container, the second floor is a wooden block, the third floor is a wooden storage system, the fourth floor is Duplo, the fifth floor is made from CD cases and on top of that is the book.



Lucy from 3A altered her plan and explained why she changed it. She shared pictures of her original plan (not pictured), the final plan (pictured here) and her building (not pictured). It was great to see Lucy modifying and improving her design throughout the challenge.

## STUDENT EXCELLENCE PROGRAM



The following high ability programs have and will be occurring during week 1 & 2, Term 4, 2020:


- Monday 5 October: Victorian High Ability Program focused on extending students in primary and secondary mathematics. This program was organised by Virtual Schools Victoria and will be held weekly throughout term 4 for select students.
- Monday 12 October & Friday 16 October: Writing for the Screen sessions are held by the Australian Centre for the Moving Image. This is an English enrichment program for students in Year 9. During these sessions students develop ideation skills and learn about what makes a good film story. They learn about characterisation, theme, characters arcs, and how to incorporate them into story structure
- Tuesday 13 October: GTAC Using Bioinformatics to Investigate the Spread of Disease. This session was conducted as a science enrichment program. In this program, students learned to use online bioinformatics tools to track the spread of corona virus, investigate the interactions between viral and host proteins and evaluated the risk that an animal species of interest to you may contract COVID-19.

We congratulate all students selected for these programs, and wish them all the best during these classes with the hope they enjoy these enrichment opportunities. We look forward to hearing some positive feedback about their experiences.
