Engaging families in Lifting Student Outcomes at Carranballac College

There is a strong correlation between positive family engagement in learning and improved student outcomes. Autism Acceptance Month

April is Autism Acceptance Month (AAM) and a great opportunity to celebrate our autistic students, learn more about how we can support and include them, and help foster understanding and acceptance of autism among all students. AAM is an offshoot of the United Nations' sanctioned World Autism Awareness Day on Tuesday 2 April 2024. The day will begin a month of global events to celebrate autistic people.

Our school is committed to understanding, including and celebrating our autistic students and values the contribution they and their families make to our school.

To acknowledge AAM we would like to share some resources that support autistic students and their families.

The Department of Education has worked with organisations for autistic people and lead researchers in autism to develop new resources for schools to help us better understand, support and celebrate the strengths of autistic students. I hope you find them useful and insightful.

- AllPlay Learn Inclusive School Communities: Monash University's AllPlay Learn team has
 developed evidence-based guidance and resources on how to create inclusive school
 communities where everyone feels welcome and supported. It includes videos on engaging with
 other parents, using inclusive language and student resources you can share with your child or
 children.
- Amaze has produced videos and tip sheets for parents on how to include families of autistic children.
- The Art of Learning video.

The department has established the Diverse Learners Hub to help meet the needs of diverse learners, including autistic students. It is key initiative of Disability Inclusion and flagship of the Autism Education Strategy.

The hub provides evidence-based advice, information and resources on best-practice inclusive teaching for autistic students.

Smoking and Vaping ban

Vaping is a public health issue that affects the whole Victorian community. Carranballac College is committed to supporting the health and well-being of our students by implementing the smoking and vaping ban in all Victorian schools.

Parents, carers, schools, and community all play an important role in protecting children and young people from, and educating them about, the harmful effects of smoking and vaping.

Research from the <u>Royal Children's Hospital</u> shows many parents and carers are not aware of the harmful effects or how their views about smoking and vaping can impact the likelihood of a young person taking up smoking or vaping.

The Department of Education has developed resources to help you learn more about the health risks of smoking and vaping. The resources include advice about how to talk to children and young people about vaping, and where to get support. THE MAN CAYE DECONSTRUCT. CHALLENGE. REDEFINE

In early Term 1, our Year 7 boys participated in full-day workshops facilitated by the Man Cave organisation. The day was divided into 3 parts, each focused on deconstructing, challenging and redefining masculinity and gender norms for our students. The Man Cave programs exist to address four key challenges currently experienced by young men:

MENTAL HEALTH: 1 in 5 boys will experience depression before they're 18, and suicide is the leading cause of death for men under 25.

GENDER INEQUALITY: Gender inequality consistently predicts higher rates of violence against women. This is driven by violence against women being condoned, mens control in decision making, physical strength and rigid gender roles.

HYPER-MASCULINE IDENTITY: "The man box" is a set of beliefs communicated by parents, the media, peers and society that pressures men to be a 'real man.' This means being self-sufficient, acting tough, having sexual prowess and using aggression.

INTER-GENERATIONAL CONNECTION: 50% of all men are not satisfied with their number of social connections and 33% are unhappy with the quality of their relationships.

STUDENT OUTCOMES

BOARDWALK JAMIESON WAY are now more motivated to grow 94% reported improved emotional 94% and change into healthier people. awareness in themselves. reported improved emotional 97% reported improved emotional 88% awareness in other boys. awareness in other boys. felt The Man Cave team role 89% better understand negative 79% modelled what healthy impacts of gender stereotypes. masculinity looks like. feel they now have the language 76% felt comfortable talking about 87% to express their emotions. their emotions and what it is to be a man.

100% of our students at both campuses rated the program as 'good' or 'excellent'.

SWPBS UPDATE

Changes to Amber Chronicles

At Carranballac College we continuously strive towards our school vision and mission of working together to foster excellence in our learners. As part of this process, we are open to feedback as we try to improve the home/school partnership, our processes and meet the needs of parents and students.


Therefore, based on your feedback of wanting to be notified of any low-level behavioural instances (known as an Amber chronicle) in relation to your child, you will now be notified automatically - via email and SMS. To access this information, you will need to log into your Compass account to view the information.



Specifically, Amber chronicles are deemed to be low-level behavioural instances, such as; disrupting learning of others or refusing to follow reasonable instructions. If and when you receive an Amber chronicle alert for your child, please take the time to speak with your child about the instance. If you would like to discuss further don't hesitate to contact the teacher of the Amber chronicle. This is the same process for when you are notified of a Green chronicle.

You may ask – what are chronicles? These sit within the 'School Wide Positive Behaviour Support' framework. SWPBS is a framework that brings together school communities to develop positive, safe and supportive learning cultures. It assists and benefits schools to improve social, emotional, behavioural and academic outcomes. Green, Amber and Red chronicles are a way that we identify and classify different types of behaviour. Below is a comparison of chronicles for 2024 as compared to the same time last year (2023) and to date. It is easy to see behaviours are trending towards the positive.

Moving forward we will continue to build and strengthen the partnership between school and home. We thank you for your ongoing feedback.
