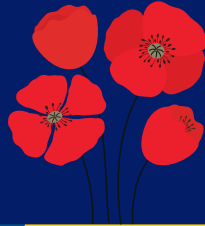

Thank you for your ongoing support, and we look forward to a fantastic Term 2.



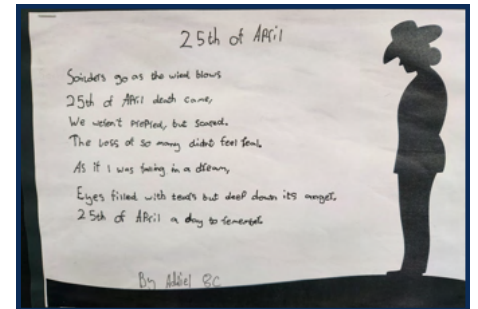
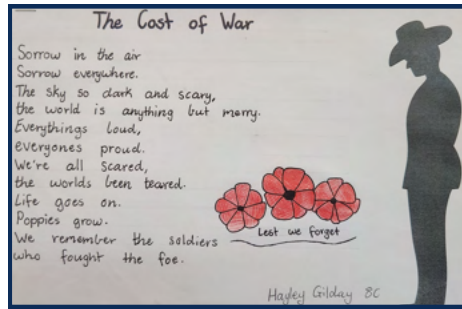
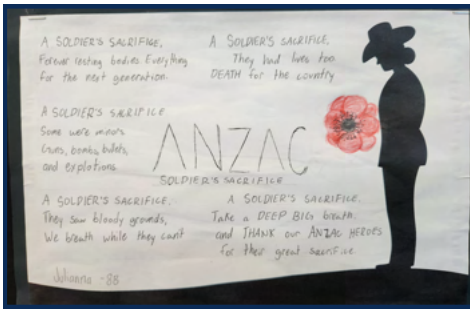
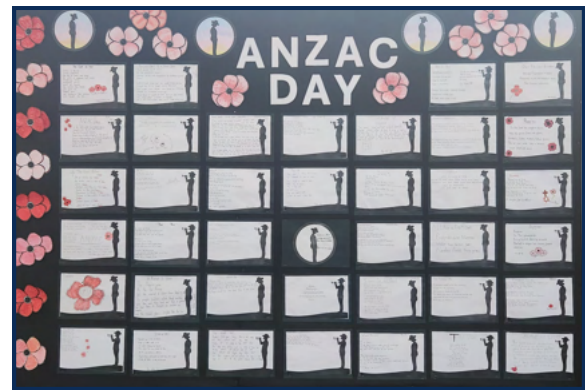
ANZAC DAY 2026

Welcome to our Grade 5/6 newsletter! We're thrilled to share what our students have been learning and experiencing this semester. We hope you enjoy these highlights and gain insight into the enriching educational journey your child is on.

Academic Highlights

Mathematics

This semester, our students have been mastering number facts for speed and accuracy, along with equivalent fractions, and comparing and ordering fractions. They've engaged in hands-on activities such as using fraction bars and interactive games to make learning fun and effective. They also explored the basics of geometry, learning to identify different shapes and their properties, including 3D objects and their nets.

English

In English, our focus has been on developing critical reading and writing skills. Students have been enhancing their reading comprehension by identifying key ideas and answering questions about texts. Discussions in book club sessions and publishing writing for an audience have helped them improve their analytical abilities and storytelling skills.

Earth Science

Our young scientists have been exploring Earth science topics, including light and planets. Through experiments and projects, such as building mini ecosystems, they've learned to observe and appreciate the natural world and how human activities impact the environment.

Geography

This semester, the students engaged in geography research. They organized and presented information about different countries using digital tools, often working with a partner. This helped them develop valuable research and collaboration skills.

Sports

Our students have been actively participating in sports like soccer, basketball, and track and field. These activities not only promote physical health but also teach teamwork and perseverance. A highlight was Athletics Day, a beautiful sunny day held on April 24th at Newport Athletics Track.

Here are some questions you can ask your child about their reading; choose a few each night to engage in conversation with your child about their nightly independent reading

BEFORE READING:

1. Looking at the title, cover and illustrations/pictures, what do you think will happen in this book?
2. What makes you think that?
3. What characters do you think might be in the book?
4. Do you think there will be a problem in the story? Why?
5. What do you already know about the topic of this book?
6. Does the topic or story relate to you or your family? How?
7. Do you think it will be like any other book you've read? If so, which one, and how do you think it will be similar?

AFTER READING:

1. Why is the title a good title for the book/story? If you had to give it a different title, what would be another good title for it?
2. Were your predictions correct? Where did you have to fix your prediction as you read?
3. If there was a problem, did it get solved? How did the character try to solve the problem?
4. What happened because of the problem?
5. Did any of the characters change through the story? Who changed, and how did they change?
6. Why do you think the author wrote this?
7. What is the most important point that the author is trying to make in his/her writing?

DURING READING:

1. What has happened so far in the story? Can you tell me using sequence words? (first, then, next, after, finally, etc.)
2. What do you predict will happen next?
3. How do you think the story will end?
4. Why do you think the character did _____?
5. What would you have done if you were the character?
6. How would you have felt if you were the character?
7. When you read, what pictures did you see in your head? How did you imagine it looked like?
8. What are you wondering about as you read? What questions do you have?
9. Think about the predictions you made before reading; do you still think the story will go that way? Why or why not? How do you think it will go now?



8. What was your favourite part? Why?
9. If you could change one part, what would you change?
10. If you could ask the author a question, what would you ask?
11. Can you retell the story in sequence order (use your fingers and sequence words: first, second, then, next, etc.)
12. Is there a character in the story that reminds you of someone you know? If so, who are they like, and why do you think that?
13. Does this book remind you of another book you know? Does it remind you of something you've experienced in real life?

For fun: Have them act out a scene from the book, draw you a picture of their favourite part to decorate the refrigerator, or write a follow-up story. They can pretend they are a book reviewer reviewing the book on TV, or they can write a letter or postcard to the author.

WHY ORAL LANGUAGE MATTERS

Oral language is one of the most important foundations for learning. Before children can read and write successfully, they need strong skills in speaking, listening, and understanding language. These skills support not only literacy, but also thinking, learning, and confidence.

Why is oral language so important?

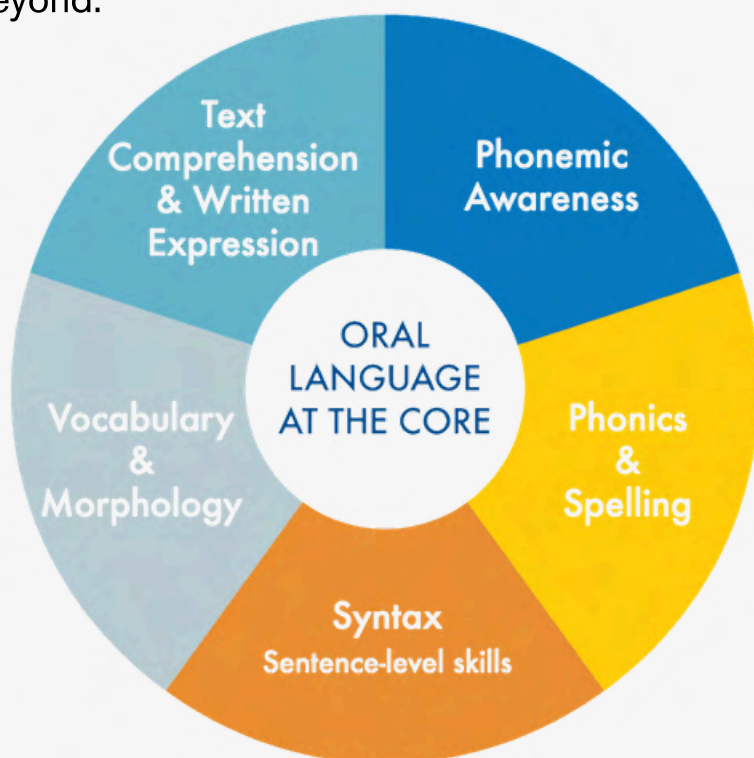
- Builds vocabulary - the more words children know, the better they understand what they read and hear
- Supports reading development - children use spoken language knowledge to make sense of texts
- Develops phonological awareness - hearing sounds, rhymes, and patterns in words
- Strengthens thinking skills - explaining ideas, asking questions, and reasoning
- Helps children understand how language works in different situations

Oral language continues to develop across all years of schooling. From Foundation to secondary school, students benefit from regular opportunities to talk, listen, explain, and discuss ideas. The more they use rich language, the more confident and capable they become as learners.

How families can support oral language at home:

- Talk together every day and encourage your child to share their ideas
- Ask questions and extend conversations (e.g. "Why do you think that?")
- Read aloud regularly—even with older children
- Discuss books, events, and everyday experiences

Strong oral language is the foundation for reading, writing, and learning. By making time for conversation and shared reading each day, families play a vital role in building the language skills children need for success at school and beyond.



FOOD TECHNOLOGY NEWS

TERM 2



A warm welcome back to Food Technology for Term 2. This week has been a fantastic start as students returned to the kitchen and engaged in practical learning experiences.

Year 7 students were introduced to their new unit, The Evolution of Food in Australia. To begin this exploration, students made lemon myrtle dampers, celebrating and acknowledging Indigenous cultures and food traditions.

Year 8 students began their unit on Fusion Foods, creating taco pizzas that combined culinary influences from Italy and Mexico. I have attached the recipe for you to try at home!

In **Food Around the World**, students made ANZAC cups, adding a variety of toppings, including whipped cream, golden syrup, chocolate, and mixed berries.

My Kitchen Rules students explored kitchen complexity by designing their own dishes using surprise ingredients, including both pantry staples and fresh produce.

Kitchen Culture students had a similar experience, creating their own dishes using provided ingredients and applying their design thinking skills.

It has been wonderful to see students building confidence, developing practical skills, and engaging in creative food design. I look forward to seeing what they achieve throughout Term 2.

Important reminders for all classes: Following these expectations helps ensure smooth, safe, and well-organised classroom routines for all students.

Please ensure you bring to each lesson:

- A container
- A drink bottle
- A pen or pencil
- Appropriate enclosed protective footwear

Students must also arrive prepared for food safety:

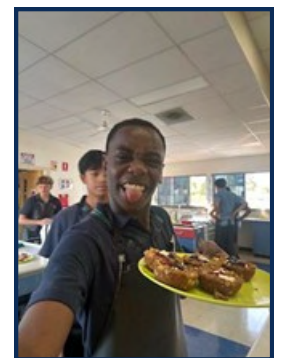
- Hair tied back (plait, bun, or clip)

RECIPE: TACO PIZZA

Preparation Time: 20 minutes

Cooking Time: 20 minutes

Makes: 1 pizza



IT'S BEEN A DELICIOUSLY BUSY TERM IN FOOD
TECHNOLOGY!

INGREDIENTS:

DOUGH

- 1 C SRF
- 100ml warm water
- ½ T margarine
- Pinch of salt
- Extra flour for kneading

TOPPING

- 150g beef mince
- ½ onion (brunoise)
- 1T of taco seasoning
- 1T water
- ¼ C passata
- 2T of refried beans
- ¼ cup of salsa
- ½ C grated cheese
- Sour cream

METHOD:

DOUGH

1. Preheat oven to 200 degrees C.
2. Place flour and salt in a large mixing bowl, add the margarine, and rub in using your fingertips until the mixture resembles sand.
3. Slowly add in the water, mixing using a spoon to form a soft dough.
4. Place on a lightly floured surface and knead until smooth. Let it rest for 10 minutes.
5. Spray a small pizza tray with oil.
6. Divide the dough into ½.
7. Roll out the dough onto the board and using a rolling pin, roll out the dough to fit the pizza tray.

TOPPING

1. Saute the onion in a frying pan for 1 minute, then add the beef mince, cooking until brown.
 2. Add the taco seasoning and 1T of water. Simmer for 1 minute. Remove from the heat and set aside.
 3. In another small bowl, mix the refried beans and salsa. Set aside.
 4. Spread the passata over the pizza dough.
 5. Dollop the refried beans and mince on top.
 6. Add the cheese then bake in the oven for 15 minutes.
- Dollop with sour cream.

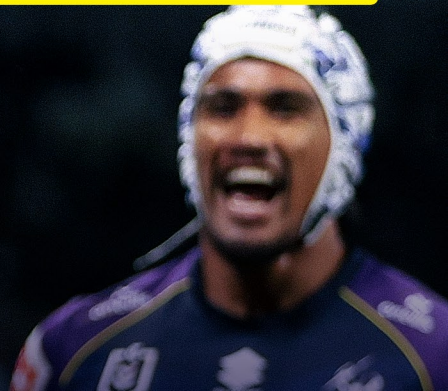
